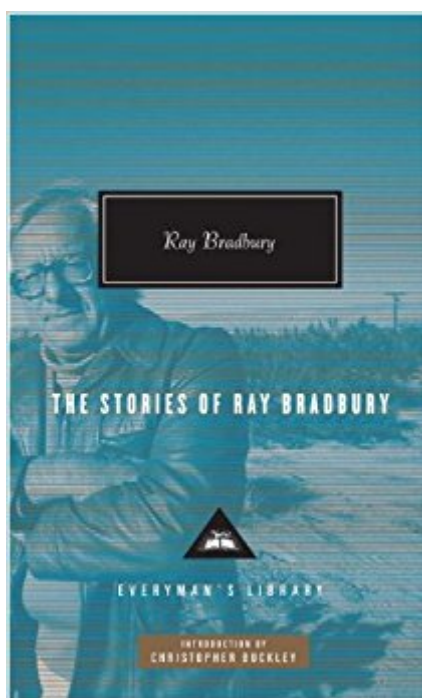


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The Stories Of Ray Bradbury (Everyman's Library Contemporary Classics Series)

The Stories of Ray Bradbury--a hundred of his best stories, selected by the author himself--is the definitive collection of one of the greatest fantasists the world has ever known. Published in 1980, the volume contains stories selected from the first four decades of Bradbury's career. There are his unique stories of Mars, which later landed in The Martian Chronicles. There are nostalgic stories of Green Town, Illinois, which Bradbury later brewed into Dandelion Wine. The treasures here also include his regional tales of Ireland and of rural Mexico, classic science fiction such as "The Fog

Horn," and the rarely reprinted novella "Frost and Fire." Among the half dozen previously uncollected stories are a few of his earliest--and most terrifying. These include the unforgettable "October Game" (which the author regards as perhaps his most shocking story amongst the thousand that he's written), and "Black Ferris," later to be transformed into the classic *Something Wicked This Way Comes*. Bradbury also contributes a revealing and highly informative look back at his own career. If you can possess only one book by the legendary Ray Bradbury, this is it.

The truth is, reading the vast new Everyman's Library edition of *The Stories of Ray Bradbury*, culling through its perfectly round 100 selections (and 1,000-plus pages), stopping to wonder why it has taken 30 years for this classic collection to join the hardcover literary canon, a thought slips in repeatedly: Stephen King was thinking way too small. [Without Ray Bradbury, there would be no Stephen King. "Stephen King]. Without Ray Bradbury, there wouldn't be American pop culture. He is the Shakespeare of American geek culture, which, in effect, is American pop culture. The Waukegan-born writer is a popularizer of ideas so frequently plundered, subjects so unusual yet routinely picked at, reading *The Stories of Ray Bradbury* becomes a crash course in not just genre but what its modern voice sounds like. If you are a Bradbury fan, this book is a MUST HAVE! Every classic Bradbury story I've read and loved over the years are in this one mammoth volume! May be the best book purchase I've ever made. Because these are short stories the questions and answers above are misleading. Narrators vary from young children to aging vampires to omniscient narrators; locations vary from small midwestern towns to city streets to cozy kitchens to distant planets; moods vary from nostalgia to horror to profound sorrow to wry humor. Yes, there's violence, but it's at once fierce and subtle. It can waken the nightmares we all have buried somewhere. Sexual content? Yes, in the best sense of revealing the power of desire. To really get a sense of the treasures here contained, just read Christopher Buckley's brilliant Introduction.For daring from time to time to step into fantasy or science fiction, Bradbury has been underappreciated for his literary skill, his astonishing intellect and his enormous humanity. Any aspiring writer should read these stories for what they can teach about both the use of language and the vagaries of the human condition. I am reading it very slowly, a story at a time, because I want to savor each one, turn it over in my mind till all its facets are revealed. But also because I want to delay reaching the end. Of course, maybe I'll just start over from page 1.

Besides Fahrenheit 451, I did not know much about Ray Bradbury until purchasing this 1000+ page super-collection of his best short stories. I immediately fell in love with him; from the first story on, Bradbury impresses with simple language and stories that are easy to follow but written with such a unique imagination, and a cruel mind talented at providing vivid scares and unexpected twists (see:

Mars is Heaven). Most fans checking this book out will most likely be familiar with the work of Bradbury, so concerning the binding and printing of this collection, you cannot find a better collection for your library. It is massive, but it easily stays open when reading earlier or later stories and laying the book flat on a table; not many other bindings can boast that fact. Also as a bonus, the Everymans Library collections come with one of those lovely silk bookmarks glued to the spine, so you don't have to go spending more money on those lavish, top of the line bookmarks that would do a work like this justice :P. Enjoy the best of Bradbury in a binding meant to be passed on for generations.

It's Bradbury. If you know Bradbury, then you get it. If you don't, you should. The categories up there don't really fit. Is there sexual content? What constitutes sexual content? How much action can there be before you have to slap on a Violence label? Silly. Read Bradbury. It's a poorly lived life if one overlooks the adventures and literary excellence in these stories over some silly categories.

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
