

Warren Wiersbe is one of my favorite Bible commentators because of his writing style. It's almost conversational, very easy and straightforward reading, and rich with thought and detail. More than

20 years ago I asked for (and received) Wiersbe's 2-volume BE series on the New Testament as a Christmas present, and I often read it for pleasure, not necessarily as part of a Bible study but just because it's so interesting and reads like a Bible story book. This book, "Be Patient (Job): Waiting on God in Difficult Times (The BE Series Commentary)" is a very interesting and helpful book about Job. Having grown up with the Bible, I know the story well, but Wiersbe's book provided a deeper insight to Job's suffering and the lessons we can learn about how he responded to it and his relationship with God. Highly recommended.

This book "waiting on God in difficult times" by Warren Wiersbe is a great book explaining generally the Bible book of Job and the larger picture. It does not go verse by verse nor does he agree with me the about the Leviathan. Still, I learned a lot and all in all a solid book about poor Job, his 3 friends, a wiser young friend, and God's rebuttal.

Job answers the question about suffering; it's an expanded story illustrating the truth of Hebrews 12:11. Wiersbe's exposition is helpful in explaining where Job's friends were wrong, and even how Job-righteous before God as he was-was wrong, too.

Wiersbe has good spiritual insight and is able to put deep truth in a very succinct way in this volume on Job. I found my thoughts stimulated by the insights given which only prodded me to further study and reflection. While not deep in word study, the simple explanation of what is happening throughout this commentary of Job and the application content was indeed appreciated and helpful.

After this book, now I can say I understand the book of Job and I understand God better as well. Churches should teach more about the book of Job, that way we can come to an understanding, through our suffering and our trials, that God always has a purpose and He always brings spiritual growth.

Very insightful into the Book of Job! Helps too if you're, or have a friend, who is dealing with pain like cancer or an incurable disease and is asking the question: WHY GOD?!?!

Take time to read this book. It is worth it. Job's life was difficult and the conversation with his friends can sometimes be confusing but Warren Wiersbe does a great job of walking you through the conversations. You will be blessed in reading this book!
