

I wouldn't get *Poker for Dummies* again, as there are so many better poker books out there. The book is over 16 years old, so many of the poker website recommendations are out of date. Another issue--The hand recommendations in the Texas Hold'em section are far too loose, among other things. If you're looking for a more useful poker book, just click on my reviews--I've got about 5-6 poker books I would recommend over this one. The *Texas Hold'em Dummies* book is much better. Side note: the coauthor Lou Kriger has an excellent poker site Pokerology.com, where he goes into very specific detail on how to play winning poker.

This is a must for your teenagers that want to swim with the big fish and play poker. Personally I don't have the patience to explain every nuance of the game to them so we had them study from this book before playing with us. No money changes hands but we have fun with chips and this is a great way for new players to learn. Better for them to learn from Mom and Dad than some shark somewhere!

Just like any "For Dummies" publication, it has to be "X" number of pages long, so "Poker For Dummies" follows suit (ha ha) by saying the same things over and over for several pages, i.e., there's a lot of filler here. And much of this material can be found online now. Still, if you are looking for an easy-to-read bound introduction to Poker games, then "Poker For Dummies" (like any "For Dummies" book) is a decent place to start. As an aside, it's kind of funny how the chapter that talks about computers is so dated, given the hardware described, but software-wise, it still appears true that Wilson poker software is the best out there (too bad Wilson software hasn't updated their graphics since this book was published). My advice would be to get this used - for the price of this book new, you can get at least two good used books on the subject through Marketplace.

Bought this as a gag gift for a poker buddy, but flipped through it first. Sound information for a novice, but sometimes it goes a bit too far. The advice on how to spot "tells" isn't going to help anyone, for example.

Did not cover enough games and what it covered it covered in too much depth for a starters guide. Also, I ordered the book new and it came used, all underline and note all over the page. Big disappointment!

"Poker for Dummies" is a reference primer that merits reading for the rube, but it's marred by embarrassing mistakes (their sample deal of Omaha/8 shows three cards of the same rank and suit), and some half-baked stratagems: would you play against someone who carried a game notepad, as they recommend? Still, "Dummies" deconstructs money management myths, gives good advice re. when and why to keep or dump, and explains why calling is often worth the investment. Their take on bluffing was enlightening too, but watch it when playing your Wednesday night chums, a.k.a. people who don't know when they're beat. It's a decent entryway with some good nuggets, but I'll refine them elsewhere.
